

ABOUT US


Woodinville Fire & Rescue (WFR) serves an area of approximately 30 square miles. This area is protected by three WFR Fire Stations.

WFR is an all career fire district, employing 57 uniformed career firefighters and 10 civilian administrative personnel. WFR responds to an estimated 4,000 calls for service annually, of which 65% are medical emergency responses.

STATION 31 - HEADQUARTERS

17718 Woodinville Snohomish Rd NE Woodinville, WA 98072

Built in 2001, the apparatus located at this station are: ladder truck, aid car, engine (pumper), command vehicle, rescue trailer, and wildland vehicle.



STATION 33 - BEAR CREEK

19401 NE 133rd St. Woodinville, WA 98077 Built in 1988 and remodeled in 2000, the apparatus located at this station are: engine (pumper), aid car, and a reserve engine (pumper).



STATION 35 - COTTAGE LAKE

17825 Avondale Rd NE Woodinville, WA 98077 Built in 1987 and remodeled in 1994, the apparatus located at this station are: engine (pumper), aid car, medic unit (staffed with King County Medic One - Redmond Fire Department paramedics).



OFFICER OF THE YEAR



CONSTRUCTION INSPECTIONS Community Risk Reduction (CRR) is an important part of Woodinville Fire & Rescue. The CRR Division works proactively with the City of Woodinville to reduce risk for the entire community. This group is responsible for implementation, administration, and enforcement of the city's municipal code.

The CRR Division works closely with the city to review and approve proposed plans for new construction, tenant improvements, tents and large events. These reviews are done to ensure fire alarms, fire sprinklers, and life safety systems are designed and installed properly.


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AVERAGE FIRST APPARATUS RESPONSE TIME


All three Woodinville Fire & Rescue stations are staffed 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, to provide prompt emergency response.





REVENUE


The Expense Fund is the District's primary operating fund. It accounts for all financial activities, except those required by State law, or directed by Board Resolution, to be accounted for in another fund.
